Benefits Planning and Assistance

Many people mistakenly believe that once they have been awarded SSI or SSDI benefits by Social Security, they must not attempt to work. They fear that to do so will immediately put their benefits at risk.

In reality, the Social Security Administration encourages people who receive disability benefits to attempt to work through the provisions of work incentives. Use of these work incentives often allows individuals to improve the quality of their lives through satisfying employment. Work Incentives may also allow individuals to keep their Medicare or Medicaid benefits while they work.
